

Artist Statement

Over the course of a nearly 20-year newspaper career, I worked as a photographer, reporter and editor for various dailies in the Bay Area and the Sacramento Valley, including more than five years as managing editor of the Fairfield Daily Republic and nearly five years as editor of the Woodland Daily Democrat. Still, I stepped away from active photography for nearly 20 years when I worked for the University of California in various capacities, including a 12-year stint as the University's principal legislative analyst in Sacramento. I

returned to serious photography about 15 years ago, diving deeply into the pleasures of digital photography. At my core, I remain a photojournalist, but I find that maturity has freed me to explore deeper impressionistic, expressive and abstract fine art subjects with my Nikon digital cameras.





To select a piece of the world, reduce it to a narrow view, two-dimensional object that still captures the essence of the subject and directs the viewer to my intent. I typically create monochrome images to force the focus to the subject, away from any adornment or other distractions. My goal is to create an image that will not only speak to the viewer, but to enter a dialog with them. To bring questions to the viewer's mind, answering some and expanding on others.

To capture the image, I use both digital capture and traditional film. However, to create the final print I work exclusively in the digital domain. This allows me a greater range of exploration than the traditional darkroom. I don't have a concrete workflow and instead let the image guide its own creation based on my initial visualization of the subject

Artist Statement

Group f/64, perhaps best personified by Ansel Adams, represented a small but influential group of photographers who captured strikingly detailed scenes of the grandeur of the grandeur of the grandeur of the great American Western landscape far removed from the bleak reality of the 1930's. Today, we face our own bleak reality; and yet, the untouched natural landscape never ceases to amaze and inspire. The Hoodoos of Mono Lake is one such scene which I captured just as cold front from the east was approaching. The drama of the clouds rising above the distant Sierra lend itself to the stark crags of the hoodoos rising from the light undulating ripples of the lake.

I am a Sacramento-based photographer who brings my unique sense of color, perspective, and space to draw the eye to states of mind that have been experienced rather than visualized. I have been fascinated with photography ever since my dad placed my trigger finger on his Realist 3D camera release button and said, "count to 10 and then shoot!" Of course, dad wasn't going to trust a 7-year-old very long, especially when there were younger sisters who also had itchy fingers. So, I waited for my chance to start shooting on my own, beginning at the age of 15 with a Brownie, capturing scenes from unusual angles, just to be different – or so I told dad.

A liberal arts education put photography on hold, followed by a career in government which was able to squelch whatever creativity I thought I had. And yet, the need to create continued to bubble near the surface as I dabbled with whatever cameras I could get my hands on -- 35 mm Minoltas, 110/126 cartridge Instamatics, and first-generation digitals (an Olympus that took 2MB photos!). Finally, I was ready to progress to the next step. I purchased a Canon EOS T4i, taught myself Lightroom and Photoshop, and, most importantly, retired from government service. (Of course, I was still a mere child at the time!). I haven't stopped since and have now progressed to a full frame Canon 5D, Mark III.

My enjoyment and enthusiasm for photography as art is displayed in the diversity of my work. I begin in Lightroom and then proceed to Photoshop as a foundation for different applications that lend tone, filters, and drama to the original image, and provide the enigmatic moods I wish to convey. I exhibit my photography in several venues in the Sacramento region and have won numerous awards, including at the prestigious Yolo Arts 2020 Art Farm Gala in which I was awarded the coveted "Cream of the Crop" for best in show.
